## KOKOMO SCHOOL CORPORATION HOSTS IB ORIENTATION SEMINAR

On December 2, 2016, Kokomo Schools and IU-Kokomo hosted an IB Orientation Seminar on the campus of IU-Kokomo. I organized the Seminar after learning about these events at a meeting for IB Association Leaders in March. The purpose was to bring district administrators, board members, and other leaders from different regions in the state to Kokomo to learn about the four IB Programs, including the application and authorization processes. In all, close to 50 representatives from 10 districts came to the Seminar. IB Americas sent their Regional Development Specialist, Phil Evans, to facilitate the seminar. He brought a variety of materials to share with the attendees. In addition, he led the Opening and Closing Plenary sessions and also participated in some of the breakouts.

In the Opening Plenary, Assistant Chancellor Todd Gambill welcomed the participants to IUK and gave a brief description of the post-secondary opportunities available to students on its campus. Then, Phil Evans gave an overview of the International Baccalaureate history and philosophy; including references to research that evidences the effectiveness of an IB education for college and career preparation. Following the Plenary, there were two consecutive breakout sessions. The breakouts were organized by IB Program, and administrators

and faculty from Kokomo's PYP, MYP, DP and CP discussed their experiences throughout the application and authorization processes, as well as how these different programs' curricula, instruction, and assessment protocols were implemented.

After a delicious lunch, the Closing Plenary brought all attendees together. Dr. Jeff Hauswald, Superintendent of Kokomo School Corporation, answered questions from the audience, together with Phil Evans and myself. At the end of the day, several of the attendees indicated their interest in pursuing the opportunity to bring one or more IB programs to their respective districts or schools. The success of this event inspired us to seriously consider organizing another similar initiative during the next school year.

#### COLLABORATION AND COOPERATION WITH FLINT AND GOSHEN IB STUDENTS

In Theory of Knowledge, we were given a brief lesson on the water crisis in Flint, Michigan. For about everyone in class, this was all new information. The original plans were really just to be aware of this emergency and to discuss each of the various perspectives of the people in Flint. We read an article in which several residents of Flint were interviewed and offered their opinions.

In thinking about this further, as International Baccalaureate students, we felt like there could definitely be some type of relief we could provide to the people of Flint. Another reason we felt a need to help was that Flint was within reach of our home in Goshen, Indiana. We then did some initial research and found there was an IB high school in Flint named Flint Southwestern Classical Academy. We then reached out to them and asked if there was any way we could help. We were excited to learn that they responded and said that they actually had enough water, but would need a place to put all of the plastic bottles. We connected with many local businesses and the City of Goshen and retrieved around 50



55-gallon containers. We then spent much time cleaning the containers, and our industrial technology class cut off the tops of each container. We contacted the local Coca-Cola distributer, and they donated recycling lids for each container. As a school, we painted and customized all of the containers so they were not just plain. This whole process took about 6 weeks. To finish the project, we wanted to deliver the containers as a class to Southwestern. Two of our teachers drove the school's box truck filled with containers, and the students and other teachers traveled to Flint via bus.

We felt fortunate to be able to spend the day with many of Southwestern's IB students. All together, we unloaded the containers and placed them throughout the school. The Southwestern students were super appreciative of the containers. This was extremely exciting for everybody as the preparation process had taken us a long time. We also appreciated feeling the togetherness we experienced with fellow IB students. We also played many games, had lunch, and got a tour of their school. The chemistry between all of us was unbelievable.



More recently, around a year later, the Southwestern students were able to come visit us at Goshen High School. This was especially exciting to reunite. The spark between all of us had not strayed. We were able to play games with the Southwestern students as well as eat lunch with them and give them a tour of our school. The mayor of Goshen, Jeremy Stutsman, was able to come meet and talk to this whole group. In addition, a large group of Primary Years Program students from West Goshen Elementary were able to join us. With the PYP students, we talked a lot about the IB learner profile and gave examples of how we show these values in our lives. The Flint Southwestern students brought some books to give to the West Goshen students. Overall, reuniting with the Southwestern students was very enjoyable

for everybody involved, and everyone wished they did not have to leave. We hope this fond relationship between Flint Southwestern Classical Academy and Goshen High School continues for many years. in Boise, Idaho, we are proud to recognize that for the first time ever, four of the IB Diploma students on the John Adams team have been granted a testing opportunity at the Connecticut IB Academy in East Hartford. Hopefully other IB schools from across the country will be able to do the same in years to come!

## WEEK WITHOUT WALLS

Week Without Walls is a tradition at Shortridge High School, an all MYP-DP Indianapolis Public School. During one week in May, the community and world become our learning laboratory. During Week Without Walls, all students participate in travel and experiential learning, then reflect using IB learner profile traits and learning outcomes. Each grade level participates in a "big trip," as well as has the opportunity for multiple "day trips" around the city and state.

Freshmen explore caves, visit the pioneer village and Gus Grissom museum, and camp at Spring Mill State Park (photo on



right). Sophomores head east--this year's trip is to Williamsburg, VA, with college visits along the way. In Williamsburg, students participate in a mock witch trial, visit the historic House of Burgesses, and walk in the footsteps of colonial Americans (photo on right). Juniors complete their Group 4 projects on-site at the Indiana Dunes, then ride the shoreline train to Chicago, where they practice their language skills in Chinatown (photo below left) and a Chicago Latino Community. Seniors plan their own trip--this year they will visit Chattanooga, Tennessee, to hike and tour Civil War sites.

Day trips include service opportunities, like building ramps for wheelchairbound individuals, community garden tending, and labyrinth building. Other day trips are more inquiry-based, including an investigation in Crown Hill Cemetery, a Columbus architecture tour (with ice cream from the soda shop), a bike tour of the city's rails to trails, and hiking at Fort Benjamin Harrison.



Students are encouraged to help design curriculum and to use their Week Without Walls time to meet their and CAS SA requirements. Week Without Walls helps create a culture on trust and mutuality, where faculty and



students explore the broader community side-by-side. This experience serves as a bookend to our year, which starts with O-week (Orientation Week), a similar cultural learning opportunity.
